8:30am Call to Order – Bill Ruckelshaus, Chair

Review Agenda: Agenda reviewed, no edits made.

Council Member Discussion:

- Action Agenda is a huge assignment, will have further discussions.
- The importance of keeping open lines of communications with the Governor, legislators, Federal entities.
- Using different formats for public input.
- Large number of responses to the action areas.

Management and Status Reports: Acting Executive Director's Report - Ron Shultz

Science Panel Status

- Criteria underway, Washington State Academy of Sciences was directed in legislation to provide 15 names of individuals, names should be provided to the Council at the September meeting, the Science Panel should work with PSAMP (with PSAMP handling the day to day operations).

Ecosystem Coordination Board Status

- A letter from the Chair of the Council will go out for nominations, suggested due date of September 5, 2007, so recommendations can be compiled for appointments at September Council meeting. The Council must appoint 14 of the 27 members. The remaining appointments are made by state agencies, the president of the WA State Senate, speaker of the House of Representatives, the Commissioner of Public Lands as well as the Governor (for tribal and federal governments).

9:25am Open Public Comment

Fred Fellerman, Friends of the Earth

- Addressed the Port of Seattle – sees it as an opportunity to have pollution in the bucket, dredging, drop back into Elliot Bay.

Kathy Fletcher, Executive Director, People for Puget Sound

- Council needs to think about issues that are outside their statutory guidelines, endorse efforts such as Cantwell's Oil Spill Prevention legislation;
- Climate change – the Council needs to be on top of the climate issues from the beginning, NW Federation did thorough analysis of sea level rises in the Puget Sound.
- Ecosystem Coordination Board – an environmental caucus group is already formed and they would appreciate the opportunity to put names forth.
- Science Panel – Would like the opportunity to make comment on names put forth, not have the decisions made in secrecy.

Terry Williams, Natural Resource Director, Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission

- Regulatory Process – Possible incentives to get ordinances done, head's up to groups that are falling behind.
- Science Panel – Tribes support the direction the Council is heading. Tribes want to work with the science groups; take a look at the knowledge that tribes can bring to reliable habitat. The tribes want directives from the Council.

9:45am **Action Area Delineation – Briefing and Council Guidance** - *Staff briefing and Leadership Council guidance on the proposed process for the delineation of Action Areas.*

Ron Shultz – discussed the proposed process, tight timelines and changes to the PSAMP map.

Panel Discussion: Discussion with interested stakeholders.

Jan Newton, PSAMP

- Provided a PowerPoint presentation comparing Puget Sound and Chesapeake Bay.

Doug Meyers, PISNERP

- Discussed the PISNERP, agreed with Jan's comparisons.

Terry Wright, Natural Resource Director, Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission

- 8 or 9 areas might make more sense, will provide recommendations by August 3, 2007.
- Possibly divide east/west in a manner that recognizes the biology of each region.

Public Input:

Eric Johnson, Assistant Executive Director, Washington State Association of Counties

- Would like to see a balance, agrees with already established boundaries,
- Would like to reduce demands, what is the function of the area, funding issues.

Mike Reed, Principal Legislative Analyst, King County

- Supports keeping existing structures
- Need for quick start and structure
- Take existing structure and create caucus for decisions.

Jacques White, PhD, The Nature Conservancy

- Not speaking on behalf of entire environmental community, but does not want another layer, need to rethink how we steward the Puget Sound Basin.
- Watersheds were chosen as logical boundaries.
- Supports PSAMP and PSNERP.

Council/Staff Follow Up:

Ron Shultz – state caucus:

- Ecology functions;
- Already organized;
- Minimum number of areas that split counties;
- Ability to gather data – too large;
- How threats found – who has action.

Bill Ruckelshaus

- Remain flexible to make changes at September 2008 meeting, public will have opportunity to comment.
